History

Stanley Davis "Stan" Jones was born in Douglas AZ, and grew up on a ranch. When his father died, his mother moved the family to Los Angeles. He attended UC Berkley, competing in rodeos to make money. However, he dropped out in 1934 to join the US Navy. After his discharge, he worked at many jobs, including as a miner, a fire fighter, and a park ranger. In his free time he wrote songs, and eventually more than 100 were recorded. His most famous,



"Riders in the Sky", was written in 1948 when he worked for the National Park Service in Death Valley. Jones wrote almost entirely Western music. He composed songs for several Western movies by Ford and others producers, including *The Searchers* and *Rio Grand*. He also played small parts in several westerns.

In 1955 Jones began writing for Disney Studios. He was co-writer of the theme song for the television series *Cheyenne*. Jones wrote again for John Ford's Civil War film *The Horse Soldiers*, in which he made an uncredited appearance as US Grant. The following year, he returned to working for Disney Studios. One major role for him was in playing the part of Wilson Brown, a Union soldier and locomotive engineer who was a member of the Andrews Raid depicted in Disney's film *The Great Locomotive Chase*.
