from Simon and Garfunkel's fifth and final studio album, *Bridge over Troubled Water*. The song was also issued as the B-side to the duo's "Cecilia" single.

Simon wrote the song in reference to Art Garfunkel's sojourn in Mexico, acting in the film *Catch-22*. He was billed Arthur Garfunkel and played the part of Lieutenant Nately, the Pilot.




Bridge over Troubled Water producer Roy Halee, Art Garfunkel and Paul Simon

Simon spent the time during filming alone in New York writing songs for *Bridge over Troubled Water*. He refers to Garfunkel in the song as "Tom", alluding to their early days
